SAPLA Business:

The new Bylaws passed. If you do not have a copy, contact Alex Stoesen, Guilford College. Greensboro, NC 27410.

Hoda Zaki has taken leave from Hampton University and will not be second vicepresident. David Mann is taking her place and Mary Ann Bowen will be the first vicepresident.

Our next meeting will be on Sept. 30, Oct. I, Oct. 2 at Wake Forest Law School.

We agreed to forgive the registration fee for all first year attendees and to pay the way for the SAPLA president to the PLANC conference in the Fall.

There was some discussion of raising dues, but a decision was postponed until the Board meets in January.

Report on Convention

The three panels focused on the needs of students financially, in preparing for law school, and in getting a job after law school. Disturbing trends in job placement may impact how students prepare for law school and the advice we give. The following trends should be considered in advising students:

- Lawyers practice law. The law degree is no longer the flexible degree it once was and students should be told delaying career choices is unwise. If one is leaning toward a business career, the person should take the MBA, not a legal degree.
- 2. The large national firms are no longer hiring. Smaller local firms are hiring and they hire who they know. Students are not judged by what they know, but by their personality. This means students should take internships to establish the contacts necessary for employment. It was suggested this should start at the undergraduate level.
 - Courses in manners, style, and getting along with others are encouraged. The law school itself hesitates to offer such courses, though some do. Students having them at the undergraduate level may have an advantage. Students who 'look' like a lawyer will have an advantage.
 - Hiring by local firms means that students go to work where they go to school. While it may be easier for some students to get into schools outside the state, if they really want to practice in a state, they should try to attend school in that state.
- 3. The law student population was described as older, more diverse, more altruistic, and poorer. More are going into public interest law. The National Association of Law Placement's national statistic is 29%. Women continue to make less than men in all areas and the increase in women lawyers may be one explanation for the declining salary rates. The national mean was \$42,000 and the median was \$36,000. (Keep in mind what those terms mean.)
 - "Poverty" may also result from the debt burden students carry. 75% of students borrow 75% of the cost of their law school education. As salaries decline the debt burden increases. Previously, pre-law advisors were told that salaries would 'take care' of the debt and student shouldn't be put off by the expense of law school. Now we're being told to caution students against too much debt.
 - Law schools have been receiving more fee waiver applications than before and some of the representatives complained that they did not know if other schools had waived the fees for the same student. A fee waiver waives the fees for the test, the LSDAS expense, and prep kit. (It should be noted that the waiver applies only for the next scheduled test from time application was received. This gives students access to the prep test for only about 3 months. However, copies can be obtained for minority students by calling Ken Lollis at Law Services at 2I5-968-I227. To get a fee waiver from a law school, one must have a FAFSA form on file with the law school. Some schools require the GAPSFAS.
 - The FAFSA is the Free Application for Federal Student Aid which will be distributed by the Secretary of Education to determine eligibility for Title IV programs. The applicant should file the financial aid form as soon as income tax information for the immediate past year is available and tax forms completed. Students are encouraged to research grant options.
 - It is unclear yet how the Clinton Administration's volunteer program will affect the pre-law student.
- 4. Pre-law advisors were encouraged to give students the same broad based liberal arts education as always, but to establish ties between the students and the legal community through alumni attorneys, internships, and pre-law clubs so the students can get into law school and be employable afterwards.
