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1. What do you enjoy most about your job?

I love working with the talented group of people on my staff to identify the applicants who will be happiest at Tulane Law School. We do so many different things here, with an extraordinarily broad and deep curriculum. As the Dean says, we are “both global and grounded.” And we attract students who have a sense of adventure.

3. Is there any advice you would give pre-law advisors as they are working with students on the application process for your law school?

Encourage your students to do as much research as they can before applying, including visiting when possible, so that they can knowledgeably convey to us that they are a good match for Tulane.

4. What are some of the unique opportunities students will find at your law school?

The opportunity to be a part of the rebuilding of New Orleans, clinical and externship experiences, our intersession boot camps, opportunities to get involved in a wide variety of projects and processes in virtually every part of New Orleans life, and a wide variety of international experiences—both during the academic year and during summers.

5. Is there anything you would like to leave pre-law advisors with as a final comment?

Both prelaw advisors and prospective students really need to come and experience New Orleans and Tulane for themselves. It’s the best way to dispel myths and really learn what we’re about. For so many years, there has been a misconception about our curriculum, for example—in fact, we offer the full range of common law, federal, and statutory courses, in addition to about 8 or 10 civil law courses. Over 85% of our students are from out of state, and although many fall in love with this area while in law school, the majority leave the state after graduation to practice in other parts of the US and abroad.
